

2025 Meeting Highlights

The 116th Annual Meeting of the SNS will occur on May 16-18, 2025; the Cleveland Clinic will host the meeting. Under SNS President, Dr. Nathan R. Selden, the scientific program "Reimagining Professionalism" will address this issue as it pertains to neurosurgical training. In addition to the cultural and historical opportunities that Cleveland has to offer, the meeting will offer an engaging and interactive program. This year's program represents a departure from past programs with an opening day on Friday, May 16th and closing session in the afternoon of Sunday, May 18th.

Friday: The morning session will focus on critical information for residency program directors and educational leaders. Topics will center on resident program design, finances, and program reputation. The RRC, ACGME, ABNS, CAST, and ARANS will provide updates. The afternoon session will feature an interactive training session on crucial conversations and conflict resolution led by the Cleveland Clinic Global Leadership and Learning Institute. The afternoon highlight will be hearing from the critically acclaimed Cleveland Symphony Conductor Franz Welser-Most.

Saturday: The local program, hosted by the Cleveland Clinic leadership of Michael Steinmetz, Deborah Benzil, and Andre Machado, will feature the institution's vision of the future of health care organizational leadership. Jim Cotelingam, Cleveland Clinic Chief Strategic Officer, will discuss the role of private equity and for-profit systems in healthcare. Additional offerings this afternoon include a historical review of Cleveland, Cushing, professionalism, and the Presidential Address. On Saturday afternoon, topics include navigating organizational change, system consolidation, and neurosurgeons in executive leadership positions. The Winn Prize lecture will cap this exciting afternoon of instruction.

Sunday: The morning session features the Grossman Award Lecture, Surgeon-Educator Fellow presentations, and an abstract session focused on professionalism education. The final session of the morning will address breaches of professionalism via an interactive workshop. The afternoon session addresses program leadership development.

Along with President Selden and the members of the Annual Meeting Program Committee, Dr. Randy Jensen and Dr. Mark Proctor, we hope to provide a program that inspires and engages attendees as we contemplate how to prepare for the challenges, we all face in the future of neurosurgical education. CAST Update

The Committee on Advanced Subspecialty Training (CAST) is charged with overseeing the accreditation of 284 Subspecialty Fellowship Programs in Neurological Surgery. Dr. Vincent Traynelis is the current Chair of CAST and Dr. William Mack is the Chair-elect. The CAST Committee has representation from each of the subspecialty fellowships: Dr. Ansar Rai, Neuro-endovascular; Dr. Perry Ball, Neurocritical Care; Dr. Brian Hoh, Cerebrovascular; Dr. Jonathan Miller, Stereotactic and Functional; Dr. Jeff Weinberg, Neurosurgical Oncology, Dr. John Golfinos, Skull Base; and Dr. Michael Steinmetz, Spine and Peripheral Nerve. There are another 33 Pediatric Fellowships accredited by the Accreditation Council for Pediatric Neurosurgery Fellowships (ACPNF). Dr. David Limbrick currently represents Pediatrics on CAST. CAST has input from multiple other medical disciplines in the endovascular and critical care domains. Dr. Howard Riina (ABNS Secretary), Dr. Richard Ellenbogen (RRC Chair), and Dr. Kristen Hirsch (ACGME Director) are ex-officio members of CAST. Leann Lepa is the CAST Administrator and Dr. Pam Derstine provides critical programmatic and administrative support.

This year, CAST reviewed 259 Annual Fellowship Program Reports. Each annual report was reviewed by Dr. Vincent Traynellis or Dr. William Mack, the CAST subspecialty representative, and a number of other individuals. After the initial reviews, three separate meetings occur to discuss the reviews and vote on approval or not. If all initial reviewers approved a program it is placed on the consent agenda. The remaining programs are discussed in detail and then approved with concern, approved with serious concern, placed on probation, or accreditation is withdrawn.

The Neuro-endovascular programs were reviewed by Dr. William Mack and the Committee members of Neuro-endovascular Surgery Advisory Committee (NESAC), chaired by Dr. Ansaar Rai. NESAC is comprised of neurosurgeons, neurologists, and radiologists all with focused practice in neuro-endovascular surgery. Seventy-two programs were reviewed of which thirty-six were on the consent agenda, nineteen approved with concern, three approved with serious concern, and three were placed on probation. There were four complement reductions, two denials of complement increase, and two approved complement increases. The recommendations of NESAC were also approved by the full CAST Committee.

Neurocritical Care and Neurotrauma Programs were initially reviewed by me and the members of the Neurocritical Care Trauma Advisory Committee (NCTAC), chaired by Dr. Perry Ball. NCTAC is comprised of accredited neurocritical care specialists from neurosurgery, neurology, and anesthesia. Twenty-eight programs were reviewed, of which eight were on the consent agenda, eleven approved with concern, one approved with serious concern, and one program was placed on probation. Two programs voluntarily withdrew their Fellowship, and four programs lost accreditation. The recommendations of NCTAC were approved by the full CAST Committee.

The remainder of the subspecialty programs (Cerebrovascular, Stereotactic and Functional, Spine, Peripheral Nerve, Neurosurgical Oncology, and Skull Base) were reviewed by individuals representing the appropriate Section in addition to the CAST representative. One hundred and fifty-nine Programs were reviewed of which hundred were on the consent agenda, thirty-eight approved with concern, five approved with serious concern, and five placed on probation. Three programs were granted a complement increase, and another 3 programs had a decrease in their complement.

All concerns are to be addressed in the following annual report and, in general, the process works as follows. Failure to address a concern may result in escalating to a serious concern the next year. Failure to rectify serious concerns will lead to probation and after a year of probation, if the concerns remain, the program will lose accreditation. There is an appeal process which is detailed on the CAST website.

CAST strives to be as equitable and transparent in the process as possible and if any program or individual has a concern, please reach out to myself, Bill, Leann, or your section representative.

Research Committee Update

The SNS Neurosurgeon-Scientist Training Program (NSTP) is now entering its third cycle this year. Since 2023, a total of 14 awards have been granted to neurosurgical residents by the NSTP. Areas of research funding have been limited to cerebrovascular, functional, and tumor-related projects since funding has been provided by a brain tumor nonprofit (StacheStrong) and the AANS/CNS Joint Sections in Cerebrovascular, Functional, and Tumor surgery. Resident awardee institutions include Brigham and Women's Hospital, Emory, Johns Hopkins, Mayo Clinic, National Institutes of Health, Northwestern, Stanford, UCLA, University of Florida, University of Washington, and Wake Forest. The NSTP serves as a formal mentored research program for those neurosurgery residents who are beginning a protected research year (Year 1) or who have already completed their protected research year (Year 2). The primary goal of this program is to provide participants with the skills, mentorship, education, and experience needed to successfully compete for individual research funding (e.g., NIH K award and R01 grants) and launch productive research careers. The NSTP seeks to also sustain the research of residents reentering their clinical responsibilities after a protected year of research.

At the 2024 CNS Annual Meeting in Houston on September 28, all NSTP recipients were able to participate in the first ever neurosurgeon-scientist symposium (see picture below). The full afternoon symposium was well attended by trainees and neurosurgeon-scientists from different institutions. Representatives of research programs available for neurosurgery trainees and junior faculty were present that included the NSTP, NREF, NINDS UE5, Emerging Investigator Program (EIP), and the NINDS NRCDP K12. Speakers discussed different early career research paths and multiple round tables permitted an open forum between trainees and faculty.

For 2025, SNS NSTP has partnered with NREF to provide links on the NREF website for Years 1 and 2 NSTP application submissions. The deadline for NSTP application submissions was December 1, 2024. A virtual study section panel will interview all applicants in the first quarter of 2025.
